damage was seen in most fields. These worms can usually be held in check with reegular cotton dust. If cases occur where the boll worm continues to build upeither use 15 lbs. cotton dust per acre or two applications of 10 percent DDT dust at the rate of 10 lbs. per acre 5 days apart.

It would be advisable to continue making inspections and counts of boll weevil damage in individual fields. Additional treatments should be made 7 io 10 percent.
