State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

QUESTION: In a flock of young pullets, how quickly should the change from growing mash to laying mash be made?

ANSWER: The change should be gradual, covering a period of 10 days to two weeks. For the first few days a mixture of 25 per cent laying mash and 75 per cent grow_ ing mash should be used; then equal parts of each, followed by a mixture of 75 per cent laying mash and 25 per cent growing mash. The birds will then be ready for straight laying mash.
