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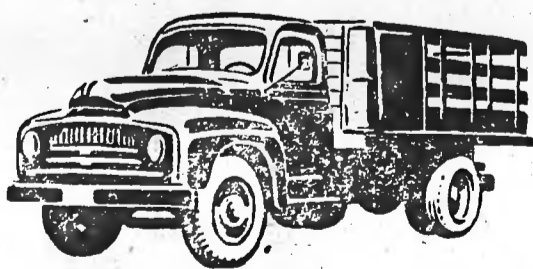
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Poultry Production Will Rise In 1952

The poultry industry can expect another banner year in 1952, according to latest figures of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Increased production of eggs and broilers is expected and turkey production may exceed the 1951 level, which was a record high. Indications are that the strong demand for poultry products will continue and prices are expected to average about the same.

While the total value of poultry products in 1952 may be as much as 5 per cent higher than the estimated \$4 billion for 1951, costs will also rise and net returns to producers may be a little lower. Commercial broiler production will probably continue its long-

time increase, assisted by the new aureomycin-vitamin B-12 feed supplement, which helps bring birds to maturity faster and on less feed. Broilers today are sup-

plying almost half of the nation's chicken meat, compared to a negligible amount 15 years ago.

All male persons are required to give in their poll, if their ages are between 21 and 50.

- Merchandise and Fixtures, Manufactured Articles, and materials in process, and stocks of new articles.
- All Farming equipment, household furniture and goods, including Radios, Electric Refrigerators, etc. All Livestock, including dogs.
- Automobiles and Trucks in your possession, whether you have paid for same or not.
- Guns, pistols, bicycles, diamonds, and jewelry, typewriters, office equipment, fertilizer and materials for resale, cotton, tobacco, provisions — and all other tangible property not specified.
