The Bureau of the Census makes the following report on cotton ginned prior to October 1, with comparative figures of last year. The report shows that only 4470 bales had been ginned in Hoke same period last year 5656 bales

Several reasons are given for this being lower than last year although the turnout as a whole is not expected to reach previous reports, dry weather, heavy weevil infestation and a shortage of cotton pickers are but a few.
