



It is also observed that midge larva infestations are usually heavy or beds treated with cottonseed meal. It is felt that a 4-9-3 with all of

al sources is preferable. Seeding: On beds that were chemically treated last Fall for weed control, a period of 90 days should lapse before seeding.

One ounce of seed (3 level tablespoonfuls) of recleaned seed per 300 square yards is sufficient. After seeding, roll or pack loose and fluffy soils. Whip heavier oils lightly with brush.
