> Even with a slump in market prices far greater than experienced in recent months, Reams says, fertilizer, properly will remain the most efficient guardian of the farmer's welfare. By increasing output per acre through fertilizer use, a farmer can not only improve his soil but maintain and even bolster his net

The explanation, Reams says, lies in the fact that while prices of other commodities the farme buys have risen more than 100 per cent, the price of fertilizer had increased only about 50 per

Applying one ton of ground limestone and 1,000 pounds of 2-12-12 fertilizer for alfalfa and permanent pasture is a must, ac cording to Reams, and adding 500 to 600 pounds of 0-9-27 each year for maintenance is also im-

"Pick out the best looking pasture you can find and ask the man who seeded and fertilized it and you'll find that he economized in other farming operation not fertilizer," says Reams
