Activities Around Antioch

One of the outstanding events of the church year is Young People's Day, which was observed in the Antioch Presbyterian Church on Sunday. Sharing the pulpit with the pastor were four of the young people — Bobby Clark and Misses Carole Everleigh, Harriet Hodgkin, and Frances McDonald.

Bobby Clark read the scripture lesson and offered the first prayer. The girls told in turn of the activities and anticipated projects if their group. During the year just ended they have held Sunday evening meetings regularly and have assisted in various church enterprises. Last June, with the pastor as leader and chaperone, they went for a "re-treat" to Montreat. They hope to repeat this experience this year. They lived in a cottage loaned for the occasion, did all their own cooking, had regular Bible study,
