Talk of a United Fund drive or a Community Chest for this county has been going on for some time, with a great many people expressing themselves as being of the opinion that such a collective appeal for the organized charities would be a good thing. It remained for Israel Mann, who is president of the Raeford Kiwanis Club this year, to do something about it. Israel got in touch with a field representative of Carolinas United who was able to give him some details on how such drives are conducted and how a community might go about getting started. He also dropped the information that the United Fund drive in Laurinburg in 1953 as one of the most successful in the United States, on a comparative population basis.
