After commenting that I thought the law required the publication by the county of a financial statement after the end of each fiscal year and that none had been published by this county after the end of the year 1952-53 (last July) I went to the courthouse and read the law on the subject. Reading it makes me wonder, . does this county belong to the county commissioners? to John McGoogan9 or to the taxpayers? I quote from the law be-

General Statutes 153-119. Time budget estimate, and at least twenty days before the adoption of the appropriation resolution the board shall: . . . (b) furnish a copy of the budget estimate to each newspaper published in the county, and (c) cause to be published in at least one newspaper published in the county a summary of the budget estimate. . (This was not done in 1953)

General Statutes 153-122, Supplemental Budget showing.-As soon as practicable before the first Monday in July, and before any levy of taxes is made, the county accountant shall submit to the board a supplemental bud-

General Statutes 153-123. Publication of statement of financial condition of county.-Simultaneously with the submission of the supplemental budget, the county cause to be published in a newspaper published in the county, a statement of the financial
