The production cost for an sere of cotton, using conservative figures, will run from \$75 to \$80. The cost of producing 15 bale of cotton per acre is almost identical the cost of producing a bale the acre. In comparing figures a bale per acre production and bale per acre production, the st will be about \$10 to \$15 difrent whereas the gross return will be about \$85 difference.

Let's put these figures on the basis of Hoke County's allotment. 19,000 acres of cotton, making 1/2 hale to the acre, will return the ounty a gross income of about \$1.615,000 or a net income, after
