Summer Duty Is Planned For National Guard

Raleigh, May 5--Tar Heel National Guardsmen, over 7,000 of them will take summer field training at Ft. McClellan, Ala., Ft. Bragg, and Camp Stewart, Ga., State Adj. Gen. John Hall Manning said today.

The field encampments will climax 40 weeks of armory training for the guardsmen. The exercises will be held during June, July and August for different

Gen. Manning announced this schedule for guard units:

The 252nd AAA Group and the 130th AAA Battallin will train at Camp Stewart, June 13-27. The IV Corps Artillery, plus the 379 Engineer Battalion, the 167 MP Battalion, and the 3424 Ordnance Co., will go to Ft. Bragg, Aug. 18-22. All units of the 30th Infantry Division train at Ft. Mc-Clellan, Aug. 15-29.

Hoke County guardsmen are of Battery A, 130th AAA Battalion, commanded by Captain Edwin D. Newton and the battalion will go to Camp Stewart June 13-27 with the 252nd AAA Group. Lt. Col.
