State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

QUESTION: Is alfalfa really the "King of the Hay Crops?"

ANSWER: In one respect, yes. It will produce more feed per acre in good years and had than any other legume forage crop, more even than permanent pasture or any other combination of plants. Alfalfa is however, still behind lespedeza in acreage. But alfalfa has a seven-month growing period, compared with two for lespedeza. Alfalfa averages three to 4 1/2 tons of hay per acre annually. A stand of alfalfa will remain productive for several years if well managed.

QUESTION: Is corn subject to greater insect infestation in the field than small grain?

ANSWER: Generally, yes. You can help prevent much insect damage to stored grain by harvesting your grain carefully. The longer grain stays in the field after maturity, the more it is subject to infestation. Because small grains are harvested quite soon after they mature, they usually are not seriously infested in the field. Corn is liable to greater field infestation than small grain because it is left in the field for a much longer time after maturity.

QUESTION: What is the best way to apply lime?

ANSWER: Lime should be mixed thoroughly with the soil to be most effective. It should be applied at a time in the rotation of crops that will permit this thorough mixing. In order to neutralize soil acids, the lime particles must be in contact with the soil particles. For crops such as alfalfa or clover-grass pastures, sufficient lime should be applied at seeding to last several years since topdressed lime is less effective.

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
