How To Obtain Emergency Feed

Following: attendance at secting in Charlotte yesterday and today by several local agricultural workers Miss Louise Blue, secretary of the Hoke County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee, today gave some details us to how Hoke farmers may make use of the classification of this as a lisaster county."

Farmers may make application for the relief in buying feed grain to the local PHA, ASC or extension service offices. The FHA committee then reviews appliestions to determine eligibility. The slightlity depends on chether the farmer is really a former who grows his own feed sormally and is thus one who suffered from the dry weather, and whether the feed he wants is for asic herds of cattle, or sheep lines are not included, nor is beef or sale. In his application the armer estimates his needs for

Following approval by the committee the ASC committee will issue the farmer a purchase order indicating the approved quantity of feed grain and the amount per hundredweight of assistance involved. The allowance will in effect pay part of the farmer's buying costs.
