He has circulated a petition asking the county commissioners for a raise in salary, and has a large number of signatures on it, I understand. In acquainting people with what he is asking them to sign, the judge is showing a sheet on which he has listed the salaries of recorder's court judges in the counties around Hoke.

So that you will see what he has in the way of a case these figures are as follows: Moore County, \$3500; Harnett, two districts, \$3600 each; Robeson, six districts with two getting \$2064 each, and the others getting \$3000, \$2400, \$2480 and \$2000; Scotland, \$2610; Lee, \$2600, Cumberland, \$5160, and City of Fayetteville \$5600. In Hoke County Moses is paid \$1200 a year, and he contends he should get more.
