Patients At McCain Ask For "Scraping"

The patients at the North Carolina Sanatorium are often hard pressed to secure materials for their Occupational Therapy work since such materials are not provided by the State as a part of their treatment. Yet this therapy is very important to the patients and their needs in many cases are simple.

Discarded scraps or remnants of cloth and nylon stockings are made into useful articles such as quilts, stuffed animals, pillows, hats, bags, aprons, scarves and other items. Many of these articles in turn are sold to the patient's friends and more material purchased to make other items thus perpetuating a continuing therapy for the total stay of the patient.

Thus, a few scraps of cloth fill many otherwise long lonely hours with pleasant and sometimes profitable bedside occupation for those less fortunate than most.

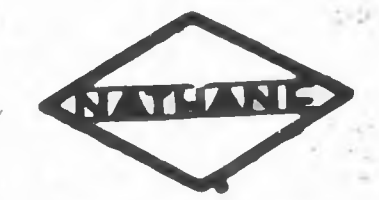
