Statistics do not coincide with the general opinion that Hoke County's farm income was at a low ebb in 1960, according to a summary made public by County Agricultural Agent W. C. Williford this week. Total sales were more than . \$400,000 higher in 1960 than in 1959—the figure being \$6,740,-

230 against \$6307.049. Crops raised in the county in

1960 brought \$5.821.305 or \$502-662 more than in 1959 but livestock income and profit from other farm commedities, including forestry, fell below last year's.

Livestock sold by Hoke farmers brought only \$723.925 in 1960 as compared to \$765.415 in 1959. Other income. including forestry was \$204.000 in 1960 and \$223,000 in 1959.

Added to the farmer's overall income were government payments amounting to \$114,671 to bring the grand total in 1960 to \$6,864,001. Broken down the farm sales in
