County Changes Tax Discounts,

The Hoke County Board of a municipal election in May were | Commissioners adopted a resolucurrent year's tax payments.

Under the new set-up a 2 per cent discount will be alowed on in August, 1 per cent in September and 1-2 per cent in November. Net taxes will be demanded in December and January.

Under the old rale the discount began in June. According to T. B. Lester, new county accountant, it has been found impossible to get tax statements out in time for taxpayers to take advantages of the 2 per cent discount in June.


