RECORDER'S COURT

Man Is Innocent Of Window Smash

"I've got a record as long as that table," said defendant Claude M. Garrison in Recorder's Court Tuesday. "I know," said Judge Harry Greene, who was looking at it. Garrison, 64, a prisoner in the McCain Sanatorium, was charged with breaking 18 windows that were the property of the State Prison Department. He told the judge that he had asked for a different cell and, when the request was denied, inquired whether his behavior on his part would get a transfer.

Yes, said the guard, and that was all Garrison needed. It was all Judge Greene needed, too, as he found the defendant not guilty.

A Lumber Bridge man was convicted in Court Tuesday of reckless driving and speeding more than 100 miles an hour in a 60 mile zone. Highway Patrolman, Joe Dupree testified he chased down Luther Jackson near N. C. 211, west of Raeford.

Judge Greene found the man guilty and suspended judgment for payment of a \$75 fine and court costs. Jackson then filed notice of appeal to Superior Court.

Thomas E. Parrish of Raleigh was found guilty of assault with a deadly weapon and a trespass at the home of his Raeford son-in-law. The ADW offense occurred July 26 and the trespass charge was for October 11. Judge Greene gave Parrish the maximum sentence possible for Recorders Court—two years, Mr. Kimbrough dwelt on Paul's statement that we are strongest when we are weak. years on the roads. Court-house officials said that Parrish was on a probationary status in another county. They anticipated he would either be jailed for violation of his probation judgment or else confined in a state hospital.

James Wesley McNeill, Negro, McCain, reckless driving 90 days, suspended for \$25, costs.

Donald C. Heffernan, white, Fort Bragg, no operators license and driving drunk; six months, suspended for \$100, costs.

James McLaughlin, Negro, Lumber Bridge, Rt. 1, trespass and larceny; 60 days, suspended for \$25, costs. A juvenile offender, picked up with McLaughlin, was remanded to the Juvenile Court presided over by Judge M. D. Yates.

Joe Strong, Jr., Indian, Shannon, non-support and assault; 12 months for non-support, suspended for payment of \$5 weekly through the Court and six months for assault, suspended on condition defendant not assault wife for two years. On both cases, Strong was ordered to pay one-half the court costs.

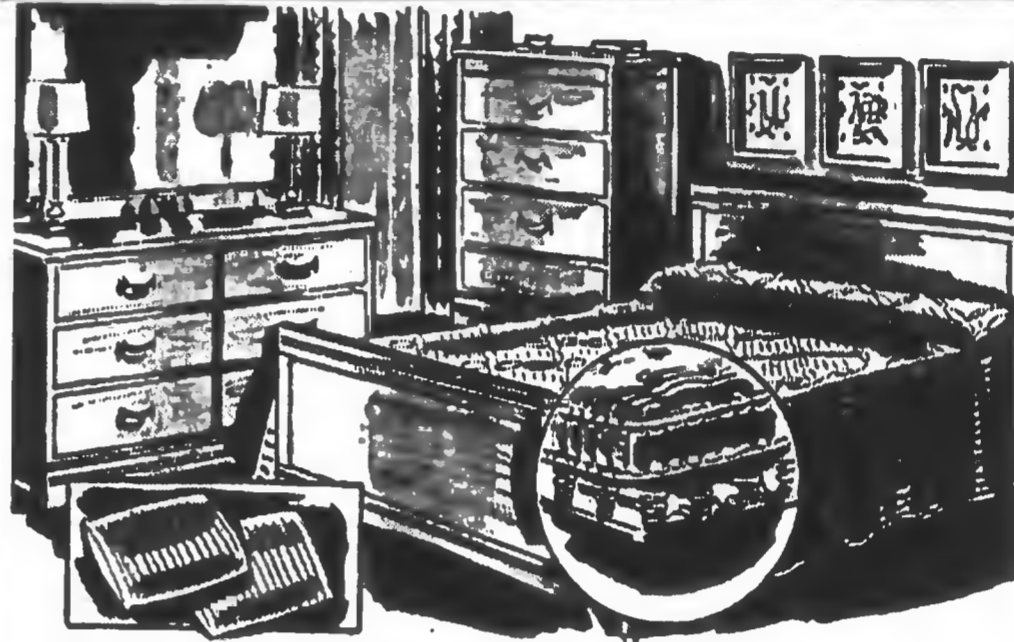

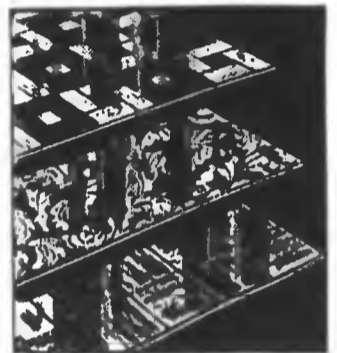
JANITOR DIES

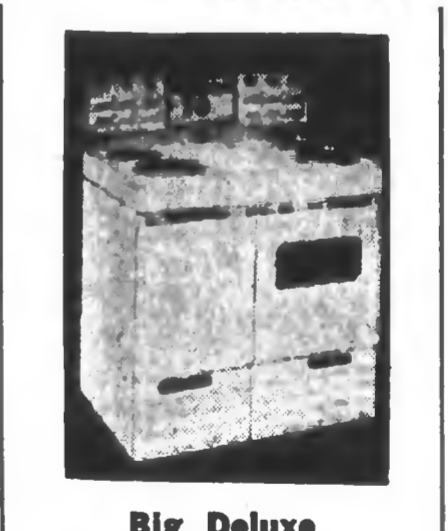

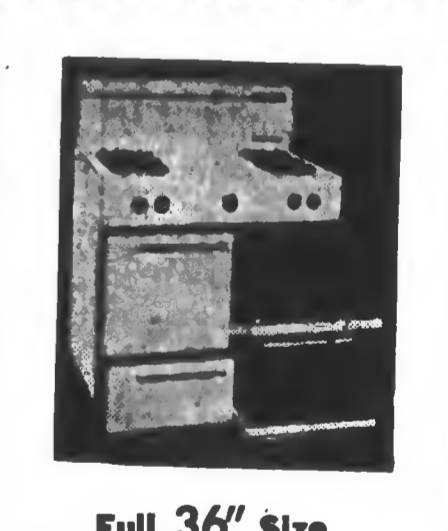
