applicants today are being turned down by the school of their choice because they waited until late spring to apply.

Practically every school of higher learning is forced to turn down applications each year because its quota is filled early. Young people of Raeford and vicinity are fortunate to have such a large number of higher education facilities within their reach. Students in some counties of North Carolina are not fortunate enough to have a single school, beyond high school level, to which they can drive to and from home dally. The result is that the majority of teen-agers in these areas are going to work without any technical specialized or professional training because they cannot afford to attend boar ling schools.

Schools near Raeford and some of their qualifications and requirements are:

Carolina Military Academy (Maxton) -- Campus comprises 67 acres. Classes are small and individual help is available. This is a preparatory school and good for those not quite ready for college. Tuition is \$1,650. Uniforms, \$230.
