agreed most about family security. Thirty - two couples, more than one out of three in the sample, said they wanted to "salt the money away." The researchers didn't ask them to specify, but families adding to their security usually follow a pattern of increasing their bank accounts, adding to their life insurance, buying saving bonds and similar investments. In addition to the couples who

agreed on this point, 16 hus-hands and 21 wives independently picked the security area. "So perhaps there is some truth to the notion that women think more about possible troublesome times," the home
