LUMBERTON - Southern National Bank of North Carolina has announced its application to the Comptroller of the Currency for approval to establish an office in Roanoke Rapids.

The proposed site would be in the Roanoke Rapids Plaza Shopping Center slated for construction in 1970.

Hector MacLean, president of Southern National Bank said in an announcement that, "The present level of industrial and agricultural growth and the predicted rate of increase indicate to us the need for additional banking services in

Roanoke Rapids, Weldon and Halifax County."

"This is," he added, "an unusually dynamic community. We at Southern National Bank are ready to contribute our best resources to further its growth by helping to attract new industry and by satisfying the ever increasing needs for financial services."

The location would be the first for Southern National in Halifax County. Presently the bank serves nearby Vance County through its office in Henderson.

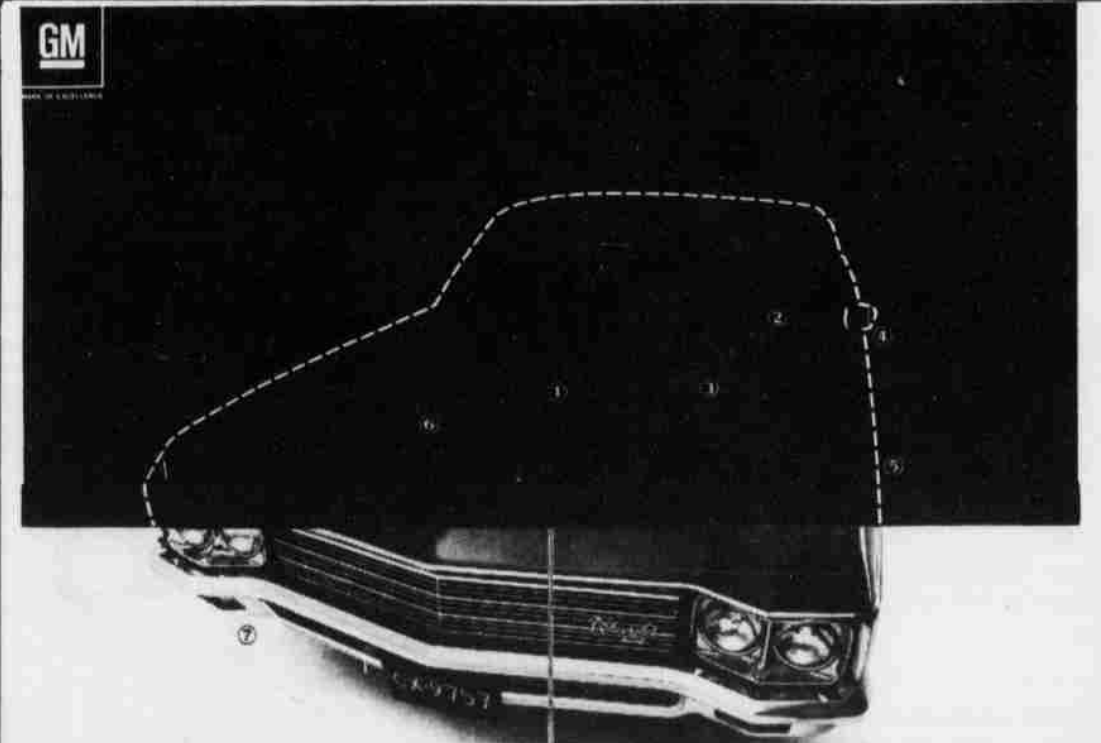

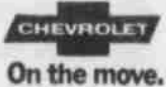
