Garden Time

If you would like to add to your bunch grape vineyard you might try these varieties if you do not already have them. Ontario is perhaps the best early American-type white grape. It ripens two to three weeks ahead of Niagara (another good white variety) and is vigorous and productive. Buffalo, a black variety, is considered by many to have the highest dessert quality of the early black types. The vines are vigorous and the berries are sweet and spicy.

Golden Muscat is a beautiful golden yellow grape which ripens with Catawba. The clusters are large and compact. The berries are also large, juicy and of excellent quality. If you would like to try a seedless variety, I would suggest New York 15305. This is a white grape with large, compact bunches. This variety is such a heavy bearer that it may be necessary to thin the bunches after they are well formed.

Most of my readers are familiar with the muscadine varieties as we have discussed them before, especially the new self-fruitful types Magnolia, Pamlico, Roanoke and others.

Filberts (hazelnuts) will do well in the upper Piedmont and mountains. Royal, Barcelona and DuChilly are good varieties. Be sure to plant at least two varieties for pollination. If you would like to plant a black walnut in a suitable location, Thomas is a good variety. For pecans, I would suggest Stuart and Desirable as they are both more resistant to scab and mildew, two common fungus troubles, than some of the other varieties. However, they are not immune. If you expect to harvest a clean crop of nuts

it will be necessary to follow a regular spray schedule requiring expensive equipment. This is not practical for home grounds.

The elderberry of the fields and fence rows has always been popular for pies and homemade wines. The domesticated varieties grow beautifully as ornamental shrubs. Here you have a dual-purpose plant if properly placed in the landscape or garden area. Adams No. 1, No. 2 and Johns are good varieties. Plant at least two varieties, near each other, for pollination.

If you have trouble locating some of the varieties of any of the fruits and nuts I have mentioned, let me know and I will put you in touch with a source of supply.
