

Planners Meet On Zone Laws

A 1962 central business district study that recommended off-street parking, closing some streets to traffic and creating attractive shopping malls was called to the attention of the Raeford Planning Board last week by an official of the Department of Conservation and Development.

Berry Williams, a staff member of the Department of Public Affairs Planning Division of the conservation and development department, recommended the planning board and the city government look at the study and consider implementing some of the suggestions.

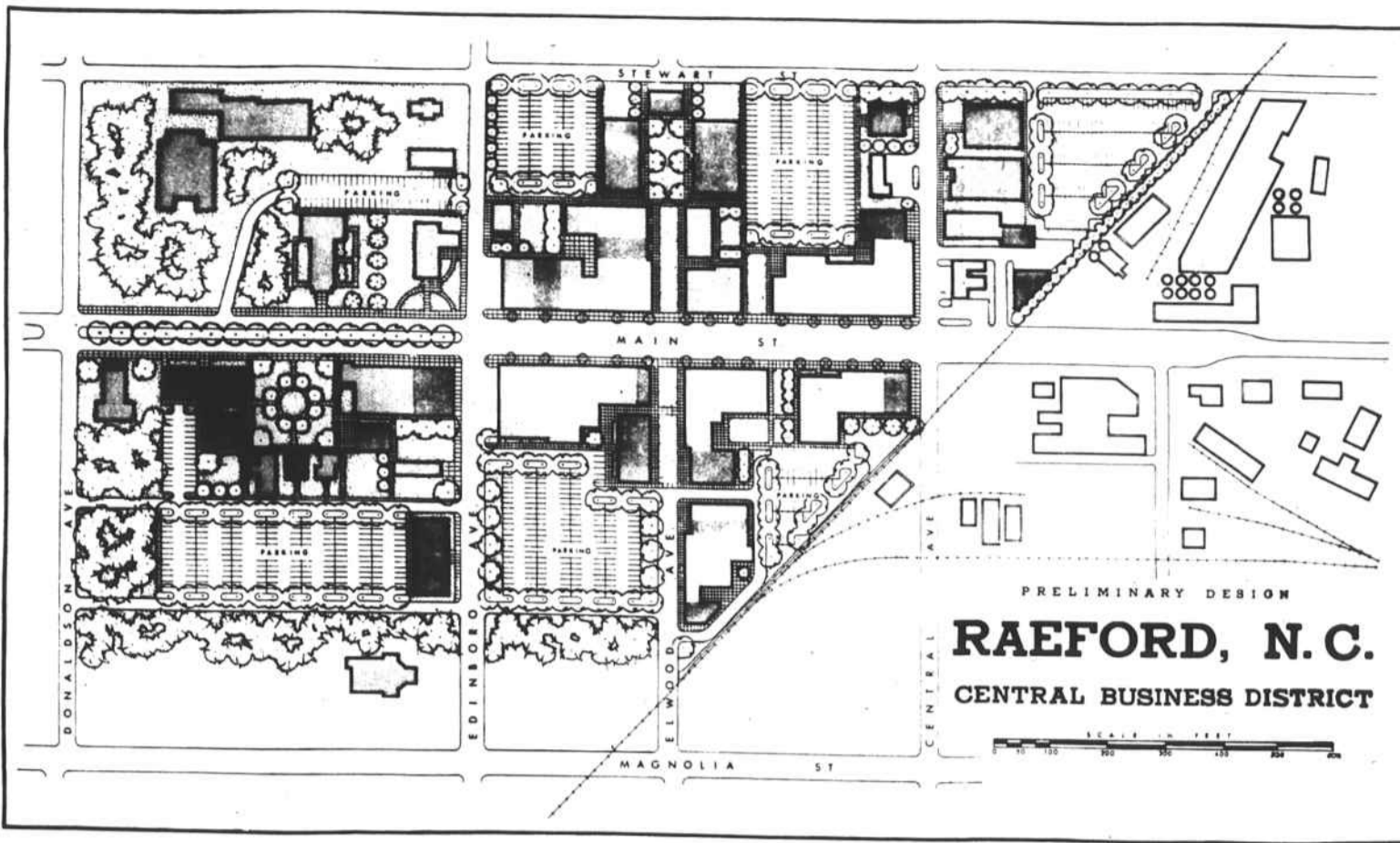
Williams met with the planning board here March 10 to explain and discuss the proposed new zoning ordinances. This is the third meeting with him, John Gaddy, city manager said, and was the last one before the public hearing on the ordinances April 27.

Gaddy said he would be happy to discuss the proposed zoning changes with anyone before the April hearing, however.

The planning board also adopted rules of procedure for the operation of the board. Regular monthly meetings were set for the first Tuesday of each month at 2 p.m. at the Court House.

Elections were set for June and provisions were adopted to allow a board chairman to succeed himself.

Bill Howell, chairman, presided at the meeting.



DOWNTOWN PLANS - A twenty-year plan drawn in 1962 to improve the central business district was brought up again at a Raeford Planning Board meeting by Berry Williams, state planner for the Department of Conservation and Development. Williams recommended that the board

study the plan and consider implementing it. Parking would be removed from Main Street and off-street lots would be provided. Elwood and Campus Avenue would be closed and the downtown area would be landscaped into an attractive shopping mall to lure shoppers into Raeford.
