Home Agents Tell How To Buy Clothes

The secret to being well-dressed is careful planning, smart shopping and proper care, home extension agents Mrs. Ellen Willis and Miss Brenda Abrams, told members of the Extension Homemakers Club at the march meetings.

In a program called "Buy - Ways to Clothing Dollars and Sense" they outlined ways to get more for the money spent on clothing.

The first step is planning, which begins with an inventory. Inspect your clothes and divide them into three groups: (a) those that can be worn without change, (b) those that need alterations, remodeling and repairs and (c) those that are no longer wearable. Get rid of the last group, which have been taking up valuable closet space.

Plan the clothing budget within the total family budget, making the most of what every person already owns. Clothing is expensive. A good plan will help prevent unnecessary and careless buying.

Atten your clothing inventory, make a list of styles and colors are most becoming. Pay attention to important details and check to see if you have appropriate accessories. Select functional, they help you perform better in all situations where you are important. They are also important in your wardrobe.

Then, when you are ready to shop, check your plan. Mrs. Willis and Miss Abrams emphasized. Choose basic styles and buy the best quality you can afford, especially in clothes you wear frequently.

Basic colors are often dark, such as black, brown or navy blue, and have a neutral effect. Buy colors which are to be worn together, such as coats, suits and dresses. Select secondary colors which will brighten or contrast with your basic colors. Use the correct color and trim in varying situations where you are important. They are also important in your wardrobe.

Repair little rips and tears immediately. Neglect can make the best clothes look worn and old. Good care of your clothes includes protection from spots and stains, brushing and washing things before ironing and allowing space between garments to keep them from crushing.

Leading Saturday sessions will be Mrs. Betty Thomas of Scotland schools on "Classroom Diagnosis," Dr. Sarah Pell of the St. Andrews faculty on "Reading in the Content Areas," Mrs. J. H. Hunneycutt of Richmond County schools on "Role of the Language Arts," and Mr. Sawyer on "The Fallacy of Testing."

In the second round of Saturday sessions Mrs. Mary Speller, supervisor of instruction for Scotland schools, will lead a discussion on "Classroom Organization," Dr. Pell, on "Classroom Creativity and Teacher-Made Materials" and Mr. Swart, on "Curriculum Development."
