the insecticide and herbicide fields as far as farming is concerned. The newest idea is to place herbicides on crops by the foam applied method. It is working well on cotton and on some vegetable crops. This method and three distinct advantages (1) It cuts down substantially on the amount of chemical needed for spraying; (2) It keeps the weeds in a moisture - saturated atmosphere for a longer period of time (3) foam devices are easily constructed, are simple and economical to use (4) Materials can be placed exactly where you want them with no drift of materials. Some techniques need to be worked out yet so the foam will stay on the weeds longer. Tests have shown that 300 of foam is formed from one gallon of water. Farmers should watch this

development because it might be a way to cut down on costs of materials for weed control
