Counties Troubled By Rising Welfare Costs

The rising number of public assistance recipients and increased medical costs under Medicaid have caused a financial crisis in some of North Carolina's 100 county departments of social services

The State Department of Social Services, based on estimates of expenditures from now through June announced today in Raleigh that 28 county departments of social services will probably deplete their appropriated funds before the fiscal year ends

A few counties have already notified the State Department of Social Services that they have insufficient funds to pay for their current social services expenditures and have no other county funds available for this purpose for the remainder of the fiscal year.

Hoke County will be able to stay within the amount appropriated for this year, county manager T.B. Lester

"For awhile it looked like we might not make it," he said, "but we have enough in the social services budget to meet

expensives.

Clifton M. Craig, N.C.
Commissioner of Social
Services, announced in Raleigh
today that if the counties are unable to supply their share of non - Federal funds required. the State will have insufficient funds to pay the medical costs of patients who are already receiving medical services in these counties.

The medical services year

payment to be made around June 10 will be mostly for services rendered these patients in April by nursing homes.
physicians, dentists,
pharmacies and other medical

providers.
Under the present social services system in this State, the Federal government pays the largest share of the costs. The State and counties share the remainder. State law requires that counties supply their share of the funds.

A court case is still pending against Jones County which refused to appropriate its budgetary share for this fiscal

The other 27 counties who are in financial difficulties at present appropriated their estimated share, but the rising number of public assistance recipients and medical costs could not be anticipated.

This is the second time this year that the rising number or recipients has created a financial crisis. Recipients in the Aid to Families with Dependent Children program had to take a cut in payments in January due to insufficient funds. The State and the counties were able to secure additional funds and the cuts were restored in the February

While it is estimated that 28 counties will have insufficient funds, many of the other county departments of social services will probably have a

What is the retirement age as ar as Social Security is oncerned? There is some onfusion concerning this wind that it is not a choice far as Social Security is concerned? There is some confusion concerning this matter. In the past, when I have spoken to high school classes - these students were supposed to be in the know they were uncertian as well. Actually, there is room for confusion as the retirement age is anywhere from age 62 up to age 65.

At the present time, both men and women may receive Social Security retirement benefits as early as age 62. However, the retiree who chooses to receive benefits when he reaches are 62. 109 local educational units when he reaches age 62, participated in the received a reduced benefit. The reduction factor is five - ninths of one percent for each month that the individual is under age 65. This means that if retirement benefit is received beginning with the month in which age 62 is reached, 80 percent of the age 65 payment
