

MORNING TRAFFIC -- Cars bringing children to school in the morning are asked to follow the traffic pattern indicated by the arrows in the above diagram-- one way traffic north on Magnolia Street and one way traffic east on Fifth Ave. Do not enter the school yard from 7:45 to 8:15. Please have children ready to dismount immediately in order that there will be no traffic holdup. In rainy weather, use afternoon traffic pattern, remembering that the buses have priority to loading and unloading areas. Do not cross yellow line in school yard.

AFTERNOON TRAFFIC - Cars picking students up from school in the afternoon are asked to pick students up on Fifth Avenue, using Magnolia one way north and Fifth one way east.
