# Stripes Need Extra Care In Pattern Choice, Cut

The moment of decision is

at hand! Surrounded by a treasure trove of fabrics displayed at the counter, you choose a stripe design for the dress you are going to sew. Always fashion - right, stripes add interest to the simplest style and can be handled to achieve striking effects. The type of stripe you choose depends on your own taste and figure type, Small - scale stripes are best for the pente, while larger - scale stripes flatter taller women. Vertical stripes add shinness and height to the figure while horizontal stripes shorten and widen the figure. To balance a figure, stripes may be used both vertically garment, or cut on the diagonal or true bias. "Advance planning" is important in selecting the stripe that looks smartest on you. The next step is choosing a dress pattern. For best results,

pick a simple pattern with comparatively few pattern pieces, and check to make sure that striped fabrics are recommended for use on the pattern envelope. Then, select your stripe! Ask yourself is it appropriate for the style of dress and your figure type. Study the design of the stripe you select. Is it balanced or unbalanced? A balanced (or even) stripe design repeats its pattern from left to right of the main, dominant making it easy to match and An unbalanced (or uneven) stripe design varies in pattern and spacing, and requires some special preparation in laying out and cutting. Sometimes it is difficult to tell whether a stripe design is balanced or not. Here's how to find out: Fold the fabric in half along the

design and coloring repeat exactly, the stripe design is balanced. Because striped fabrics must be matched at the seams, you

Preparation pays off when you're sewing with stripes. So, it is very important for you to study your diess pattern and fabric carefully. It you use your stripe design vertically. choose the dominant stope design to run up and down the

center front and center back. Once you establish the position of the center front lengthwise line, you will find it easy to match all the other pieces in relation to it. If you will use your stripe design horizonally, plan to have the dominant stripe run across the bodice from and back and just below the shoulders, matching the stripes at the scams. The stripe design should match at the stitching line of the pattern pieces rather than the cutting

A very important new regulation regarding the handling of Government Loan Cotton has been made this year, and one that farmers should not overlook. When the grower receives his Covernment Classification Card showing grade and staple length of his cotton, there will be a date on it. The new regulations state that if a cotton in Government Loan he must place it in the bonded warehouse withing 15 days of the date shown on the card. If ne does not do this and decides later to put it in, a new sample classification and the total cost of this will run about \$1,00 per

The purpose of this new regulation is to help keep the cotton in top condition and also to sell to the mills the same grades of cotton that the sample represented.

### Lennon Enters **Busing Issue**

Representative Alton Lennon announced today that he had joined in filing a brief with the Supreme Court relating to the problem of busing students to accomplish

racial balance in the schools.

The brief sets forth the legislative history of the antiagreement amendment to the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and precisely what Congress intended by its wording.

"The Congress has expressly forbidden the assignment and transportation of pupils to overcome racial imbalance,"

the Congressman stated.
"It is essential that the Supreme Court go into the question in depth and write a comprehensive opinion that reflects the will and the intent of the representatives of the in the Congress, Lennon stressed.

Supreme Court has announced that it will review school assignment cases during the October term.

There is no doubt that the decision reached will determine the future of American education," the Congressman stated, "and it is my hope that our basic neighborhood concept and high quality of education will be preserved.
