minimum of expense.
On July 16, 1970, we as nutrition workers, attended a workshop in Sanford where we had the experience of making this cabinet. We were a bit awkward at first with the

We were very fortunate to have the cooperation of Mr. Villines, Mr. Simpson, Mr. Williams, and Mr. Locklear of the High School Ag. Dept., who measured and cut our cabinets. They guided us patiently until

we finished. We made one 13 inch cabinet and two 26 inch cabinets for extra storage.


