Sandhills Expects Record Enrollment

Sandhills Community College will open for the 1971-72 academic year with a projected enrollment of more than 1200 students. Six hundred and fifty returning students and more than six hundred new students have pre-registered, according to college officials, an indication that the final count will exceed the 1255 students enrolled in the fall of 1970.

For the past month some fifty new students a day, Mondays through Fridays, have been briefed on all phases of the college by members of the faculty and staff and conducted on tours of the campus facilities. Registration will begin September 7-8 and classes will begin September 9 according to James C. Hatstead, dean of student services.

Orientation for the faculty as planned by Dr. Harry G. Beard, dean of instruction, will be held September 7 and 8 in the mornings. Dr. Raymond A. Stone, president of Sandhills, Henry I. Rahn, director of occupational education, Dr. LeRoy Dare, director of the college transfer division, D.L. Furches, director of adult education, Eugene Watts, business manager, Edward W. DuRant, Sr., director of development, and Mrs. Leone H. Koster, director of the news bureau, will speak briefly at the faculty sessions.

A highlight of the faculty orientation will be a luncheon September 7 at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Stone. A reception honoring new instructors and members of the staff will be held September 8 at the Country Club of North Carolina.
