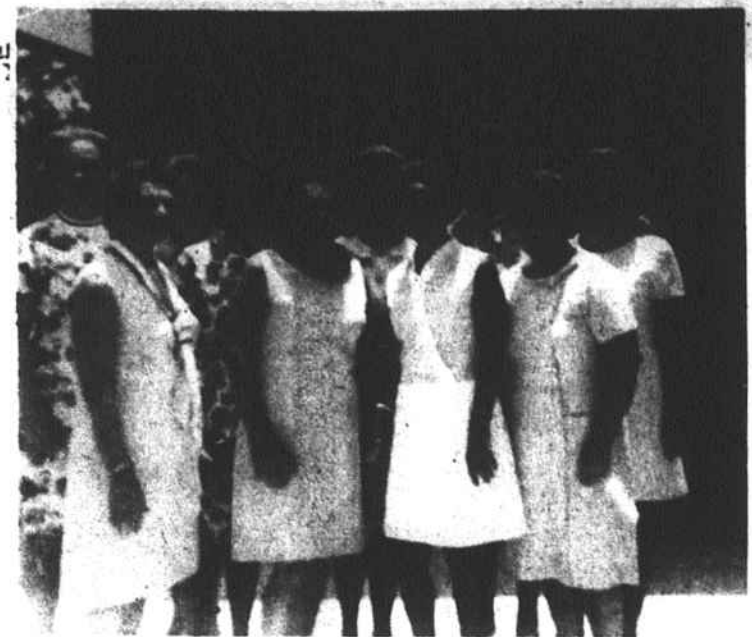

COG To Meet In Lumberton

The Lumber River Council of Government executive committee will meet at 7:30 tonight in Lumberton.

Hoke County delegates are Ralph Barnhart, representing the county and Graham Clark from Raeford.

Included on the agenda are additional appointments to the manpower council and consideration of means to increase communications between the COG and local governments.

The COG made public its treasurer's report for July - December, showing expenses of \$209,187.42. Deposits were listed as \$230,223.28.

Expenditures included \$56,024.31 for salaries and \$4,110.78 for travel. Program expenses were \$89,099.22 and \$45,669.79 for the caterer for the hot lunch program.
