## Court Term To Begin

A one week term of criminal Superior Court will open Monday with Judge James H. Pou Bailey presiding.

Thirty-three cases will be examined by the grand jury for indictments, according to the court calendar.

Those persons facing indictment are Robert Williams, larceny and receiving, breaking and entering; Dwight Locklear, receiving, uttering and passing forged check; John L. Locklear, breaking and entering, receiving, and breaking and entering and larceny; Roosevelt Woods, two counts of breaking and entering and larceny, two counts of receiving, felonious breaking and entering and larceny; Charles Locklear, breaking and entering; Daniel R. Locklear, breaking and entering and larceny; Jimmy Locklear, assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill (ADWITK).

Also, Larry Bell, receiving; Luther Locklear, Jr., ADWITK; Tommy Barnes, credit card theft; Redell Clark, breaking and entering and larceny; Roy N. Jacobs, breaking and entering and larceny; Reta Faye Chavis, forgery, uttering and passing forged check; Jerry B. B. B., three counts of breaking and

entering and larceny; Harry L. Scurlock, two counts of forgery, two counts of uttering and passing forged check; and Billy R. Locklear, three counts of breaking and entering and larceny, three counts of receiving.

Set for trial Monday is Jessie Luckie, accused of the double murder of a Raeford couple last October. However, Luckie has been sent this week to Dorothea Dix Hospital in Raleigh for a pre-trial diagnostic evaluation. Sheriff Dave Barrington said. The case is not expected to be heard as scheduled.

The kidnapping and attempted rape trial of James A. McCrowe, Ricky McMillan and Charles Bullard is set for the opening day. The three have been in custody since Dec. 1973, awaiting trial. A Florida couple, James M. Falscroft and Shannon L. Falscroft, are scheduled to stand trial on charges of possession of marijuana with intent to sell.

Several of the cases set to begin Monday involve defendants expected to be indicted on breaking and entering and related charges.

## Maynor Named Athlete Of The Week

Hoke High's George Maynor was named "Athlete of the Week" last Thursday by the Fayetteville Times.

The 6-foot-2 guard was selected for his 31-point performance in the Clinton game Jan. 10-a 83-64 win for the Buck's 10th straight victory.

Maynor hit 15 from the floor and connected with one of two free throws to take scoring honors that night.

In an interview with Bill Kirby Jr., sports writer for the Times, Maynor said of his award, "It's a terrific feeling. I played all right but both myself and the team could have done better. We didn't play well against Clinton and we didn't play well Tuesday against Scotland."

The Bucks added Laurinburg-Scotland to their string of victories on Jan. 14, downing the Scots 84-71.

"The thing we have to do is correct the mistakes we have been guilty of if we plan to continue winning ball games," the 17-year-old senior told Kirby.

Against Clinton, Maynor scored 28 points in 20 minutes. He spent much of the game against Scotland on the bench with foul trouble and scored nine points.

"We're not a one-man show at Hoke," Maynor said. "We are a team and when I saw teammates like Alphonso Haynes and Allen Thomas open, I passed off. They get the job done as well as I can."

Maynor, who averages 19 points a game, was named to the All-Southeastern 3A Conference squad as a junior.
