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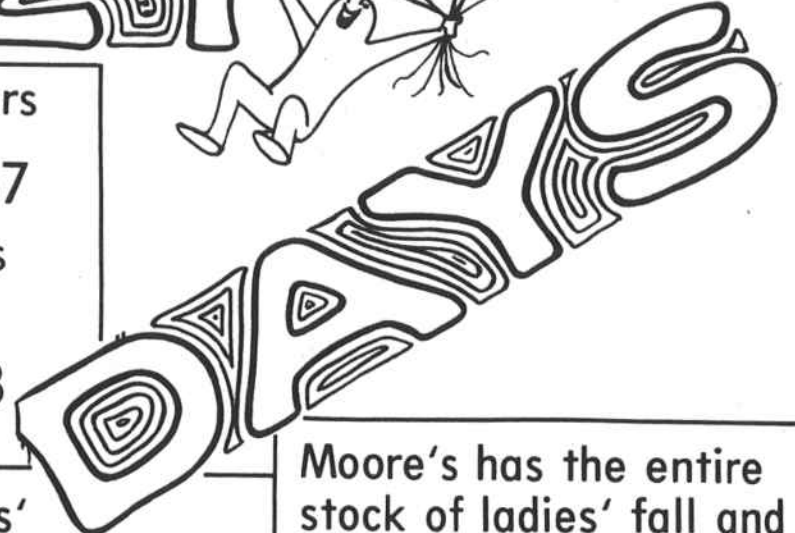

**Blythe Heads
Dairy Co-Op**

J. Halley Blythe of Hoke County was elected president of the Coble Dairy Cooperative at the annual meeting of directors last week in Lexington.

Blythe has served as a director of Coble for 15 years and as a member of the executive board for the past ten years.

He succeeds Ed Young of Florence, S.C. as president.

Blythe operates the only dairy farm in the county, with approximately 200 Holsteins. Originally from Mecklenburg County, he has been a dairy farmer for 25 years.

Blythe said that 280 producers make up the Coble cooperative. It has sales in five states and had a gross operating business of \$45,000,000 last year.

Farm Items

The on-farm cotton variety tests gave some surprising results this year. The leader was the McNair 612 Variety with a yield of 1,020 pounds of lint per acre. This is the average from tests in eight counties. Second was Coker 8304 with a yield of 997 pounds of lint. Third was Coker 310 with 918 pounds of lint. Fourth was Coker 1104 with 909 pounds of lint. Coker 201 produced 875 pounds of lint.

Many new herbicides are available for cotton in 1975. Study these and use the chemicals that will control your specific weed problem. A new paper is out on the importance of bedding cotton lands early.

Topdressing of all small grain should be done during the month of February, preferably between February 1 - 15. The suggested rates for topdressing (including nitrogen applied at planting) is as follows: Wheat 80 - 100 pounds, Oats 80 pounds; barley 80 pounds and rye 80 pounds. Higher rates may cause lodging in all oats, barley and rye varieties and all currently grown wheat varieties except Coker 68-15; McNair 4823 and Blueboy II. Not more than 100 pounds are suggested on any variety because of the increased susceptibility to glume blotch disease. In addition, with the high cost of nitrogen, higher rates will increase the cost of production.

The extension office is working in 1975 with a large number of families in farm management and home management. The economic downturn has caused families to think more about management. Rotation of crops and the control of nematodes is about every crop is being stressed. Reports coming back from the N.C. Department of Agriculture show the population of most fields is high. Plans for a complete weed control program is most important for high yields. Farmers are being encouraged to use certified seeds even though they do cost more.

Nutrition aides are working with low income families, trying to teach them ways to get better nutrition out of the food they purchase. Our staff is available to any family in the county by request and we are backed up by research specialists at N.C. State University.

Rose Co-Sponsors

Food Aid Legislation

Congressman Charlie Rose, announced his co-sponsorship of a bill which designed to find a long-range solution to growing world food shortages.

Rose said that the US has been generously assisting these developing nations as well as other nations which have been hit by disaster for many years through Public Law 480. The new bill co-sponsored by Rose says that the US will give priority in food assistance programs to those countries who demonstrate a desire to help themselves.

This bill says that while the US will not turn her back on any country in the face of extreme emergency, no P.L. 480 funds will be issued to those countries who are not making a reasonable effort to initiate their own program of family planning, according to Rose.
