## Chancellor States Need For Veterinary School

North Carolina needs a School of Veterinary Medicine to serve the state's billion-dollar animal livestock industry, Dr. John T. Caldwell, chancellor of North Carolina State University, said last week.

"There are only places for 27 N.C. veterinary students this year in other states, yet there are about 100 well-qualified pre-vet graduates," he added.

He said other states have indicated they will decrease the number of available spaces for N.C. students next year.

Chancellor Caldwell made the statements in a news conference on the N.C. State campus.

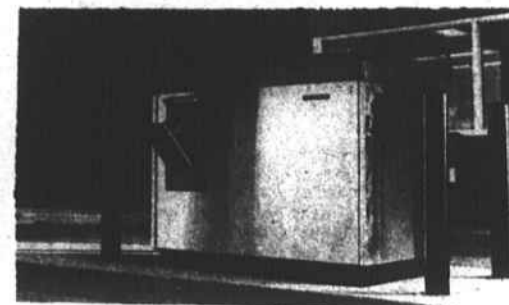
He said North Carolina's livestock industry, including poultry, has topped one billion dollars annually, is the

largest single source of farm income in the state, and is expanding rapidly.

"In addition to providing vitally needed veterinary training, a School of Veterinary Medicine in North Carolina," he said, "would offer invaluable research services for its important livestock industry, and provide continuing educational opportunity for veterinarians practicing in the state, referral services for veterinary clinics not now available, and a strengthening of the research capability of our University's biological sciences program."

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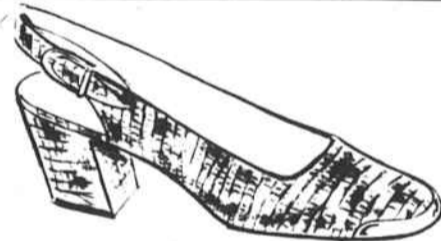
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
