# **Masked Men Rob Grocer**

Three men wearing stockings over their faces robbed a Hoke County storekeeper last week. Joe Palmer told deputies that the

men, one carrying a sawed-off shoutgun, came in the Palmet's gas and grocery store about 11 p.m. on April 8. They threw him down behind the counter and told him not to look at them, Palmer said. The men took his wallet with \$50

and other personal possessions from his pockets and got about \$60 from the cash register.

Dogs from the McCain prison unit were brought to track the three men through a housing development called Wrightsboro to where they apparently had left a vehicle.

Items such as the stockings and the stock of the weapon were found on the road.


