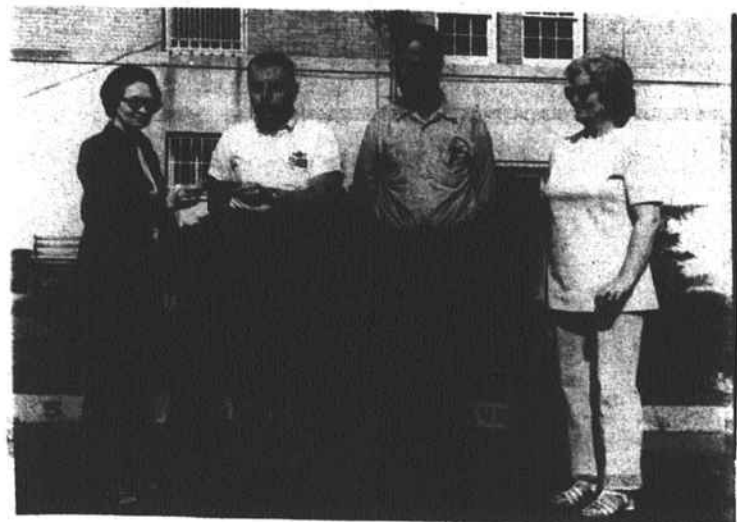

Gas Earnings Up

Earnings of \$1.50 per share for the twelve months ended March 31 have been reported to stockholders of North Carolina Natural Gas Corporation. This compares with \$1.40 per share reported for the same period last year.

Revenues for the twelve months were \$34,247,406 compared to \$32,879,621 for last year. In March, Company stockholders received a dividend of 23c per share, an increase of 2c per share in the quarterly dividend rate.
