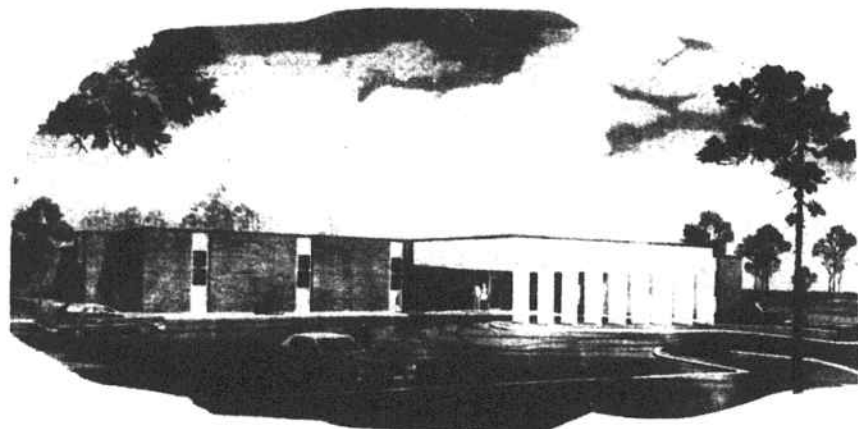
Doctor Takes Sandhills Post

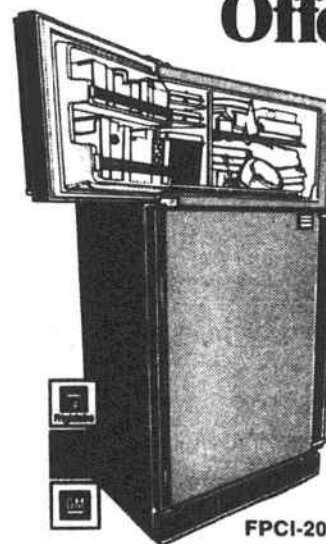

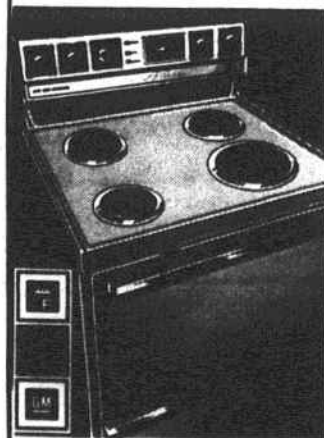
