## DMV Studies Services, Eyes Improvements

Edward L. Powell, commissioner of motor vehicles, announced the completion of the initial phase of a study on the vehicle services system, particularly on vehicle registration.

The project is a joint effort of the registration, data processing, and planning and research sections of the Division of Motor Vehicles.

The first report of the four-phase study reviews the present system and will be followed by recommendations and implementation of improvements in

the registration system over the next several years. According to Powell, the new system will include the simplification of the forms submitted, prompt issuance of vehicle titles, increased accuracy and availability of information pertaining to registered vehicles.

"Our personnel are very much involved in improving the system of motor vehicle registration," said Powell. "We believe the final result will be an important service to the people of North Carolina."
