The consent judgment signed by U.S. Judge Eugene A. Gordon orders the social services department to re-instate AFDC (Aid to Families with Dependent Children) benefits retroactive to June 1 to Locklear and her two children.

Locklear, her two children, and the three grandchildren were ordered restored as of July 1. Food stamp benefits were ordered restored at the time the order was signed.

The judgment also orders the department to hold a hearing to determine any reduction in benefits because of the monthly Social

Security payments of \$29.10 for each grandchild. Mrs. Locklear, who sought no

damages, contended she gave notice of her desire to appeal the termination of benefits and that no hearing was afforded her. Costs in the action were ordered


