Appalachian State University will not admit new students for its spring semester due to a capacity enrollment this fall, according to C.H. Gilstrap, director of admissions at Appalachian.

Gilstrap said that Appalachian would continue to receive and admit for the spring semester applications from graduate students, transfers completing college parallel programs at community or junior colleges, and previously enrolled ASU students who apply for readmission.

Gilstrap said that the university also would honor committments to some 50 entering freshmen and transfers who applications are pending.


