## Gravesite Remembered

Through contributions from the Hoke County Bar Association, a new marker was placed on the grave of William Brown McQueen, the first Clerk of Superior Court

Born in 1876 and known as "Willie Brown" by nearly everyone, he was buried beside his wife, Wilhelema Hassel McQueen, in Raeford Cemetery in 1943. His wife died in 1931.

With money solicited from at-torneys Bobby McNeill, Palmer Willcox, Bill Moses, Charles Hostetler, and G.B.Rowland, a Raeford woman who wanted to honor McQueen in memoriam took

McQueen became the first Clerk when the county was formed in 1911. A practicing lawyer, he later served as Judge of Recorder's

The McQueens made their home on Stewart St. in Raeford.
