Heilig-Meyers Company today announced record revenues and earning for the year ended March 31, 1976. Total revenues increased by 21.0 per cent to \$46.8 million from \$38.7 million last year. Net income increased from \$1,853,922 to \$2,916,481, an increase of 57.3 per cent. Earnings per share rose to \$1.32 per share compared to \$.84 per share for the previous year.

The Company also increased its semi-annual dividend to \$.10 per share from \$.08 per share previously paid. The dividend is payable on May 29th to stockholders of record on May 17, 1976.

Dewey Allen Inman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Inman, was graduated cum laude in sociology.

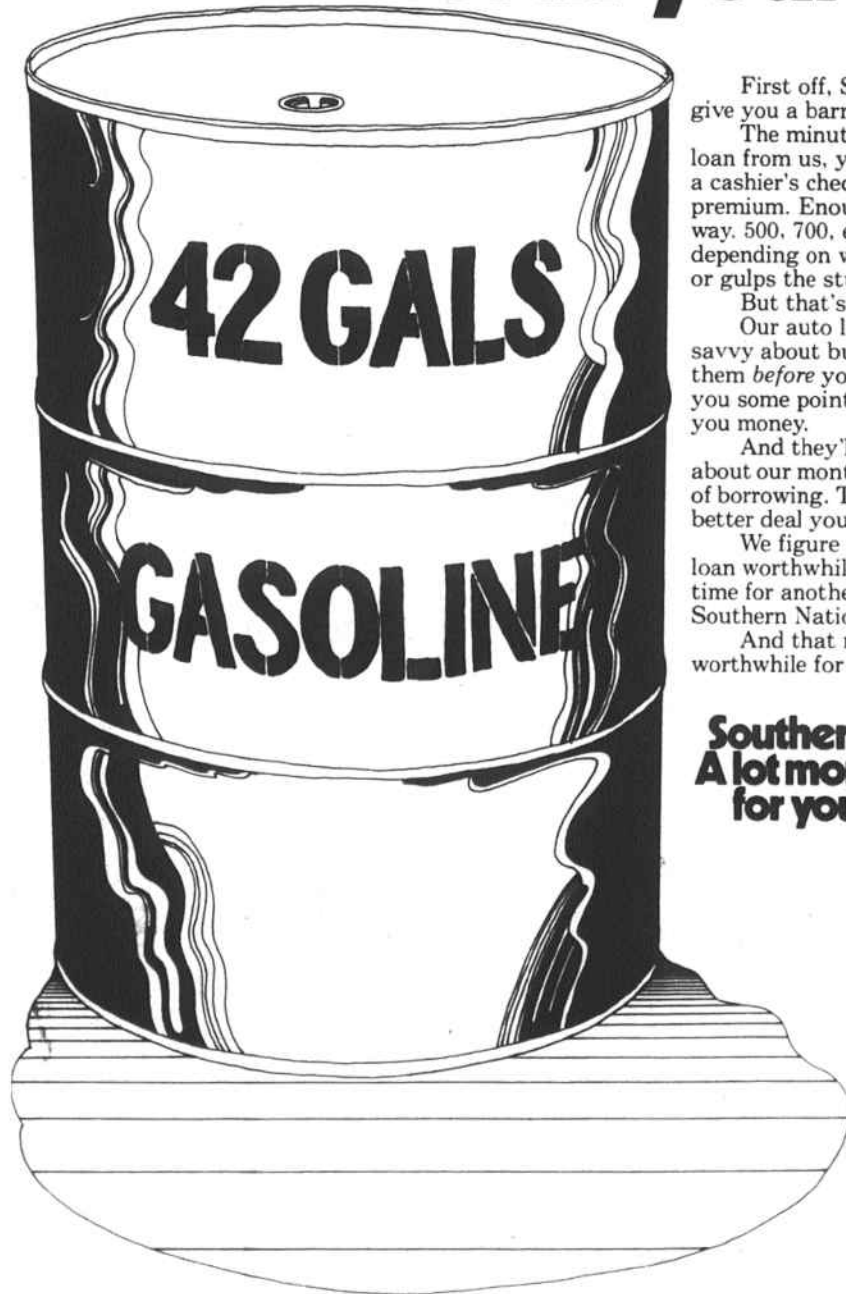
