Father Cleared Of Rape, Witness Won't Testify

The state's star witness refused to testify Friday in a District Court hearing on a rape charge against Clive Osling, Rt. 3, Raeford. Judge Joseph Dupree ruled no probable cause in the case for lack of testimony to substantiate a statement taken by deputies from the complainant, Era Osling, the accused's 16-year-old daughter. Ruby Young Wearins, Rt. 2, Maxton, plead not guilty and was found not guilty to charges of passing a worthless check in the amount of \$304.00 to Robert

McKoy, and of failure to appear in court on a previous date. In other action against Mrs. Wearins, she pleaded guilty to speeding 70 in a 55 MPH zone and was fined \$10 and costs.

Ronald Allen Wallmark, 732 Glensford Dr., Fayetteville, pleaded and was found guilty of possession of a controlled substance, marijuana, and fined \$200 and costs.

Marvin Ray Jones, 514 Grant St., Raeford, was found not guilty of driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor when the state presented no evidence.

Richard Jerome Almond, Rt. 1, Aberdeen, pleaded guilty to a charge of DUI and was sentenced to 90 days, suspended for 12 months, and ordered to surrender his operators license for a period of 12 months. He was granted limited driving privileges during that time. He was also fined \$150 and court costs.

Joe Allen Boahn, Rt. 1, Box 215,

Raeford, pleaded not guilty to a charge of DUI. The court found him guilty of the lesser included offense of operating a motor vehicle upon a public highway after consuming such a quantity of intoxicating liquor as to directly and visually affect his operation of said vehicle. He was sentenced to jail for 60 days, suspended, and fined \$100 and costs.

David Junior Chavis, 950 N. Lee St., Rockingham, pleaded guilty to DUI, (second offense), and was sentenced to six months, suspended for two years. He was ordered to violate no penal laws of the state of North Carolina for a period of two years and was fined \$250 with \$50 of the fine being remitted for good cause shown. A charge of failure to notify the Department of Motor Vehicles of a change of address was voluntarily dismissed.

Raymond Wallace, Rt. 3, Raeford, pleaded not guilty to driving while his operator's license was revoked. He was found not guilty by the court.

Roosevelt Campbell Jr., 412 S. Magnolia St., Raeford, pleaded guilty to a charge of no operator's license and was sentenced to 30 days suspended and fined \$25.

Lend Floyd Virgil, Rt. 2, Raeford, pleaded guilty to a charge of failing to drive upon the right half of the highway and prayer for judgment was continued for two years. He was ordered to pay costs.

Harold Eugene Thornton, 6344 Pawling Ct., Fayetteville, pleaded guilty of exceeding a safe speed and was ordered to pay cost of action.

Thomas Lauder Jr., High Point, pleaded guilty to exceeding a safe speed and was ordered to pay cost of action.

Ernest Jacobs, Southern Pines, pleaded guilty to speeding 66 in a 55 MPH zone and a prayer for judgment was continued for two years.

Bennie Louis Henderson, Red Springs, pleaded guilty to speeding 74 in a 55 MPH zone and was sentenced to 30 days, suspended for 12 months, fined \$25, costs, and ordered to violate no speed law of the state for 12 months.

Harvey Gene Colley, 116 Raeford, pleaded guilty to exceeding a safe speed and was ordered to pay cost of action.

Willis Earl Gibson Jr., Forest City, pleaded guilty to speeding 70 in a 55 MPH zone and was fined \$15 and costs.

Will Rogers Jr. To Visit Hope Mills 4th Celebration

Will Rogers, Jr., son of the late American humorist, will be the special guest for the Hope Mills Bicentennial celebration July 3 - 4 in downtown Hope Mills.

The celebration, which is billed as the largest in the state for the holiday weekend, will open with a parade July 3. The XVIII Airborne Corps Sport Parachute Club will perform later in the afternoon with four skydivers jumping into Hope Mills lake.

A continuous round of fairs and displays is planned for the two-day celebration. On Sunday afternoon,

seven Revolutionary War regiments will stage a mock battle following the official flag raising ceremony by the South View Senior High Army JROTC.

Rogers will be featured Sunday evening and present "The Best of Will Rogers", a program incorporating the material and mannerisms of his father.


A fireworks display will begin at 9 P.M. on Sunday.

Hope Mills has been designated an official Bicentennial community by the American Revolution Bicentennial Association. The local Bicentennial committee plans to construct a park as a lasting memorial.
