month dealing with the need to have some control of the actions of regulatory agencies.

If a bill which I discussed in the June newsletter has been a law, these actions would almost certainly have been stopped. That is the bill that would give Congress 60 days to disapprove new policies these agencies set, in effect setting up a process to "veto" agency rules.

These are not isolated incidents, though they may be more extreme than some. Every week, the agencies are setting new rules and regulations which affect businesses and people's private lives.

We pulled off the road under the edge of the tall pines and got out of the car. The underbrush beneath the trees had been burned and our shoes were soon coated with soot.

"Is that one?" said my son Scott. He was looking at a pine tree that was glazed white with sap that had dripped and hardened. A small, dark hole could be seen in the trunk in the middle of the most heavily glazed portion of the tree.

"Sure is," I answered. "There's another one in that tree over there. This underbrush was intentionally burned to provide the open areas under these trees. These woodpeckers like it that way."

"Imagine," said Scott with a trace of awe, "that's where a red-cockaded woodpecker lives. They're so rare that I never thought I'd see one of their trees."

For Scott -- who is only 10 years old -- our visit to a colony of one of North Carolina's rarest birds was a treat he won't forget soon. But he was even more impressed when I told him that there were lots of people working hard to make sure that the red-cockaded woodpecker and other rare and endangered species of wildlife would survive and perhaps even become relatively numerous again.

For one thing, there is a new and widespread national interest in the plight of rare and endangered species, as well as non-game

species which are still quite common. In North Carolina, the Wildlife Resources Commission is spear-heading a program that is especially designed to help non-game and endangered species of wildlife.

In the past, all the work done by the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission to help non-game and endangered species has been paid for with money from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses. One reason, obviously, is because people who hunt and fish are interested in the welfare of all kinds of fish and wildlife. These sportsmen have gladly carried the financial burden for this kind of work, and it has paid off over the years.

Unfortunately, the taxpayer in North Carolina has never been able to contribute to these programs because no general tax funds are appropriated to the Wildlife Commission. In other words, wildlife research, management and protection are paid for only by hunters and fishermen, and the only way someone who didn't hunt or fish could contribute was by buying a license they didn't plan to use. Some have done this, of course, but now the Wildlife Commission has set up a special program for people who want to contribute money which would be used entirely for projects designed to help non-game and endangered species.

By contributing \$5 to the Carolina Conservationist program, anyone can help with this valuable work. (Not unexpectedly, the first contribution came from a man who already buys hunting and fishing licenses). Those who contribute \$5 will receive a colorful decal designating them as a Carolina Conservationist for one year. Those who contribute \$25 or more for one year will receive both the decal and a full color, limited edition, 16" x 20" wildlife print of the red-cockaded woodpecker (the same print featured on the July cover of WILDLIFE IN NORTH CAROLINA magazine). The lithograph will be numbered and signed by the artist, Duane Raver. A new species will be "featured" each year to encourage annual participation in the program. Those interested should mail their contributions to Carolina Conservationist, N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission, Division of Education, 325 N. Salisbury Street, Raleigh, N.C. 27611. Checks should be made payable to the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission and designated as a Carolina Conservationist contribution.

By making a contribution, you can take part in a variety of programs to insure that all kinds of endangered plants and non-game wildlife species are saved for future generations. The July issue of WILDLIFE IN NORTH CAROLINA has a series of articles on non-game endangered species programs, as well as reports on the current status of some of these species.

**TOUGH DIGGING**

Ever tried to dig up a pine stump? If you have, you no doubt discovered the difficulty of the job. The reason—a pine has a long tap root. A 22-year-old slash pine growing in sandy southern soil, for example, will have a tap root about five feet long with a diameter just below the ground that is larger than the tree trunk at chest height.

which may be in Lumberton or Fayetteville. Any business trips which are related to his other job, county manager, such as the annual three day county managers' convention, are paid for out of the travel budget for the county commissioners or else the contingency fund.

In other county departments, the travel budget for each is set as: Board of elections, \$750; Tax listing office, \$1,400; Tax collector's office, \$650; Register of deeds, \$400; Sheriff, \$500; Inspection department, \$2,200; Civil preparedness office, \$800; Veteran's service, \$250; Recreation commission, \$1,220; Senior citizens coordinator, \$750; and public library, \$250.

Lowest travel budget among the county agencies is the extension service office, the farm agent and home agent. Only \$115 of county tax money is approved for travel, but the bulk of their travel expense is paid by state funds. Staffers receive a 15 cents per mile allowance through the state and each agent is authorized 1,000 miles a month. The \$115 is a cushion in case the state travel allowance is exhausted and is used for transportation of 4-H groups to camp, according to farm agent Wendell Young.

Lester attributed the rise in this year's travel appropriations to general inflation along with increased travel.

"As long as people can get gas, they're going to travel. I don't think it's being abused at the present time. I think most trips are legitimate. There are probably some that would be just as well off to stay home," he said.

"But you usually learn something at these conferences. You do have a better staff of people if they are informed. In order to be informed, you have to go where the instruction is," he said.
