FRESH LEMONS

Even though prices may seem high -- lemons are anything but a luxury item. For fresh lemons are one of the most versatile foods

You can use the juice for appetizers, main dishes, desserts and beverages. The peel provides some of the best flavor around and helps even low - cost foods taste expensive. The shells can be used as boats for sauces and desserts.

As a seasoning, fresh lemons are second - to - none. Fresh lemon juice can be used to replace high calorie butter on vegetables and popcorn. And if you're trying to cut down on your salt intake, fresh lemons are an excellent substitute

seasoning.
Then, when you're finished with all the insides and outsides of fresh lemons, pop the remains in the

garbage disposal to deodorize it and the whole kitchen. What more do you want? Whatever the price. lemons are a bargain.

BUYING PRUNES

Here's a question for you. What is the most popular dried fruit? If

you said prunes, you're right.
When those popular prunes are
on your shopping list, keep this in mind. Prunes are graded according to size. They vary from extra large with 40 or less prunes per pound -- to small -- with 85 or more prunes per pound.

There is no difference in food value, but there may be a difference

Usually your best buy is the small prunes. Packs of smaller prunes usually contain more fruit per pound and the smaller - sized prunes usually sell at a lower price.

How you plan to use the prunes. may help you decide what size to buy. Large prunes are often preferred for salads and to stuff

Small prunes are excellent to serve with breakfast cereal and for grinding and cooking.

You may also see some prunes that are labeled tenderized -- this means they have been partially cooked before packaging. Ten-derized prunes usually cost a little more than the non - tenderized

By the way, one pound of dried prunes usually provides 12 half cup servings. So try them in salads. cakes and breads.
