Judge Gavin included a recommendation in Bullard's file suggesting that the Division of Motor Vehicles impose no further suspension upon the Defendant resulting from this case as the only issue of fact was the hour of the operation of the vehicle and whether it was within the period set forth in Bullard's limited driver's

permit.
