Many highly flammable fabrics have already been removed from the consumer's market. The Flamable Fabrics Act has made fiber and fabric manufacturers aware that nonflammable fibers and fabrics are a priority for textile researchers to develop.

Recently the consumer Product Safety Commission has received many consumer inquiries in recent days concerning the chemical TRIS which is used to make some children's sleepwear, sizes 0-14. The Environmental Defense Fund has asked that the chemical TRIS be banned because it may pose a cancer hazard.


