Farm Items

Soybean producers should do a good job of harvesting and turning your attention to converting this crop into money. North Carolina farmers leave far too many beans in the field even though expenses for those beans have already been paid. The machines we have today are capable of reducing harvest losses to one bushel or less per acre. The differences are in the combine operators. They need to continually adjust their equipment throughout the day and moisture levels change. This can be as much as two or three percent from morning till night. The cylinder speed should be altered throughout the day. The drier the beans, the slower the cylinder speed, real speed and height, rate of travel and the cutterbar height, all of which are factors to consider when harvesting.

Tobacco farmers who would like to look at new equipment can see it at the "Tobacco Farmer Show" in Greenville, N.C. at the Tobacco Farmers Warehouse. The dates are November 15 - 16 and 17. Entertainment will be the Kitty Wells Show on Tuesday and Jerry Clower on Wednesday and Thursday. Other products are grain storage and handling, hog production, cattle equipment and educational and recreational exhibits.

Researchers from Kansas State University say beef animals may need to be fed for only 100 days to produce a desirable product. There are three feeding programs, pasture grazing, 49 extra days and 98 extra days. Grass fed and short fed cattle graded good and the longer fed graded low choice. Taste panels rated short fed animals comparable to long fed animals. Tenderness did not differ significantly between feeding groups.
