

Farm Items By W.S. Young, Agri. Ext. Chr.

Soybean producers should do a good job of harvesting and turn your attention to converting this crop into money. North Carolina farmers leave far too many beans in the field even though expenses for those beans have already been paid. The machines we have today are capable of reducing harvest losses to one bushel or less per acre. The differences are in the combine operators. They need to continually adjust their equipment throughout the day and mositure levels change. This can be as much as two or three percent from morning till night. The cylinder speed should be altered throughout the day. The drier the beans, the slower the cylinder speed, real speed, and cylinder speed, real speed and height, rate of travel and the cutterbar height, all of which are factors to consider when harvest-

Taste panels rated short fed animals comparable to long fed animals. Tenderness did not differ significantly between feeding groups.
