# Coverage For Firemen Studied

# Raeford Kiwanis Club Names T. B. Lester Man Of The Year

T.B. Lester was named Man of the Year by the Raeford Kiwanis Club at the annual Ladies' Night Program held at the Captain's Place last Thursday night. Lester, who died Nov. 8, 1977,

served as the first county manager for Hoke County. He began his career in county government in 1961 when he was employed as county accountant, tax supervisor, purchasing agent and clerk to the Board of County Commissioners.

Bill Moses, local attorney, pre-sented the award to Lester's wife, Mrs. Lorena Lester.

Other awards given at the din ner-dance were Best Program and Attendance awards. Best Program was won by Frank Crumpler for a program featuring Earl Yarborough, former Raeford native, as guest speaker. Attendance awards went to Marion Gatlin, 34 years of perfect attendance; Dr. Julius Jor-dan, 25 years and J.H. Austin, 24

Speaker for the occasion was LaFon Vereen of Lumberton. Music was provided by D&L Music Makers.

The presentation of the Man of the Year Award by Bill Moses was

"Tonight we honor the memory of a man who served us all well for many years.

"He was born in Florence, S.C., on February 13, 1912. His father, the late T.B. Lester, Sr. was a dairy operator and bookkeeper for Hoke Oil & Fertilizer Company, and also

served as a county commissioner.
"T.B. Lester graduated from
Raeford High School and attended N.C. State College. He worked as a bookkeeper for Raeford Gin Co. and later was office manager for Edinburgh and White-Tex Mills here in Raeford.

"He was first sergeant and a lieutenant in Battery F 252nd C.A., North Carolina National Guard. He entered Federal Service with that local unit when it was called into active duty in 1940 during

World War II.
"During World War II, he served as instructor in the Antiaircraft School at Camp Davis, N.C. He also served overseas in Belgium and Germany. By the end of the war, he had attained the rank of major. He then became executive officer of the local National Guard Battalion. He further attained the rank of Lietuenant Colonel and commanded the 2nd Battalion, 252nd Armor. He served in the National Guard in an administrative capacity for about 15 years. He retired from military service on February 12, 1972, upon reaching the age of 60.

He was employed on February Hoke County as County accountant, tax supervisor, purchasing agent, and clerk to the Board of County Commissioners. Later as county government be-came more complex, he became Hoke County's first County Manager. He served in this capacity

1977. "T.B. Lester was a dedicated church man. He attended regularly, served as Chairman of the Administrative Board of Raeford Methodist Church, and served on its committees, including the Commission on Finance.

'Col. Lester served Hoke County and its citizens well all his life.

"I enjoyed working with him on many occasions, and especially in church work. His wisdom, advice. experience, and understanding of problems were always appreciated.
"His was a quiet determination,

dedicated to purposeful living. If I had to come up with a statement of principle of his life, it would probably be as follows:

"If the firemen think they need both (kinds of insurance), I'll recommend to the council that they have it. If we can't get it through Vardell, then we'll do it through another agent," Rae-ford City Manager Robert Drumwright said Tuesday in reference to insurance coverage for the city's 35 volunteer

Last week it was learned that disability insurance with Nationwide Insurance Co. for the firemen was cancelled Jan. 7 by the company after the city

failed to renew the policy. The coverage had been in effect since 1967. It provided \$15,000 in life insurance and \$80 a week for disability, the city manager

Drumwright said he didn't renew the insurance because he felt it might constitute a conflict of interest for the city to buy it from Councilman Vardell Hedgpeth, the local Nationwide representative, who was elected to the board last Nov.

# Listing Deadline Tuesday

The deadline for listing per-sonal property taxes in Hoke County is next Tuesday, Jan. 31. Penalties will apply after 5 p.m. Tuesday unless individual extensions have been granted. Tax Supervisor Les Simpson

Military personnel, although they may be exempt from the tax. must list even if legal residence has been established in another state, he said.

A preliminary check with the state Attorney General's office indicated that it was a conflict of interest, the city manager said. However, he said that another letter, explaining the situation in more detail, has been sent to Raleigh and might elicit a different opinion.

In any event, he said that the firemen are eligible for workmen's compensation benefits under the state and might not need additional coverage.

Through workmen's compensation, volunteer firemen can draw disability payments if injured on the job. The weekly payments would amount to two thirds of the fireman's average 12-month salary, according to the city manager.

Last year the state came up with a \$25,000 automatic death benefit for any volunteer fire-man killed in the line of duty.

Because of the increase in state life insurance, Drumwright said the city reduced its life insurance with Nationwide to \$1,000 and upped its weekly disability coverage to \$100.

"I believe that the workmen's compensation is a broader type of coverage," Drumwright said Tuesday. "It includes a death benefit to the family. And I believe if a fireman got pneumonia while fighting a fire, he would be eligible for disability payments under workmen's compensation.'

The city manager said he has talked with Raeford Fire Chief Crawford Thomas, Jr. and arranged to have an insurance specialist meet with firemen at their next training session to discuss their coverage. If the firemen think they need both kinds of insurance. Drumwright said he would recommend that the city provide it.


